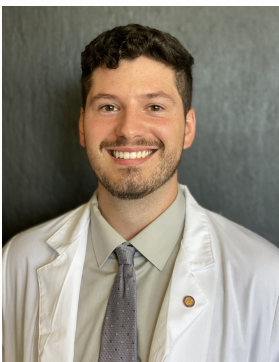

Respect, compassion, hard work and inclusivity are the hallmark tenants of our program.
