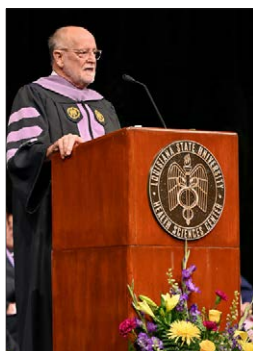

LSUSD Class of 2026 Celebrated in Commencement Ceremonies

The LSU Health New Orleans School of Dentistry held its Spring 2026 Pre-Commencement Ceremony at the UNO Lakefront Arena on May 13, honoring 124 graduates: 80 in dentistry, 37 in dental hygiene, and seven in dental laboratory technology.

"We are here to recognize all of our graduates who have worked so hard and accomplished so much. Our programs are demanding and challenging, and to successfully complete these programs takes determination, dedication, and sacrifice. As such, we could not be prouder of the graduates sitting here today," said Dr. John Gallo, Dean (shown above), who presided over the ceremony.

Dr. Gary DeWitt, Clinical Assistant Professor, LSUSD Class of 1979 alumnus, and LSUSD Alumni Association President, gave an inspiring keynote address. DeWitt emphasized that dentistry is a collaborative profession, blending science, artistry, and human connection, and urged graduates to commit to lifelong learning as the field continues to evolve. He underscored the importance of compassionate, patient-centered care alongside ethics, trust, and professional engagement, encouraging graduates to give back through service, to mentor others, and to stay connected to LSUSD.

"The most successful professionals are not those who know everything today, but those who remain curious tomorrow," DeWitt explained. "This moment, and tomorrow, are not the finish line. It's the starting point of a career that will challenge you, inspire you, and ultimately define the impact that you create."

School leaders and faculty gathered on stage to present graduates with medallions and hoods, to share where they will practice, and to recognize several graduates with honors and awards of excellence in academics, leadership, service, and more—[view the list](#).

Many members of the Class of 2026 are choosing to keep their skills and expertise close to home. Graduates of the Dental Laboratory Technology (DLT) program have secured positions in Louisiana and Mississippi, where they will contribute to the oral healthcare and dental laboratory workforce. Similarly, all 37 graduates of the Dental Hygiene (DH) program are entering practice in Louisiana and neighboring Texas, helping expand access to preventive and patient-centered oral healthcare throughout the region.

Among Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS) graduates, approximately 76% are beginning their careers in states including Louisiana, Texas, South Carolina, Georgia, Massachusetts, Florida, Oklahoma, Tennessee, North Carolina,

Alabama, and Arkansas, with many choosing to remain in Louisiana and across the Gulf South. About 24% of DDS graduates have been accepted into advanced education and specialty training programs in Louisiana, Texas, Alabama, Oklahoma, Colorado, New Jersey, Washington, Mississippi, and the U.S. Navy, where they will continue their professional development before returning to serve patients and communities. The graduates will be attending residencies in General Practice, Advanced Education in General Dentistry, Pediatric Dentistry, Prosthodontics, Orthodontics, Endodontics, Periodontics, and Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery.

Graduates selected faculty members as recipients of the Golden Apple Excellence in Teaching Award, a special honor presented annually to one faculty member in each program—DLT, DH, and DDS—recognizing teaching effectiveness, a deep commitment to student success, meaningful mentorship, and exemplary role modeling.

Julio Zavala, DLT Program Director and Associate Professor of Clinical Prosthodontics, was selected as the Golden Apple Award recipient for the Program in DLT. Students described Zavala as a dedicated mentor who invests significant time and energy into their growth and development and challenges them to reach their full potential.

For the Program in Dental Hygiene, Tricia Barker, Interim Program Director and Associate Professor of Clinical Comprehensive Dentistry, was selected as the Golden Apple Award recipient. Graduates praised her kindness, positivity, support, and dedication, distinguishing her as an exceptional educator and a trusted role model.

Representing the DDS program, Dr. Maurice "Moe" Lonergan, Assistant Professor of Clinical Comprehensive Dentistry, was named the Golden Apple Award recipient. Students recognized Dr. Lonergan for encouraging growth, challenging them, and genuinely investing in their personal and professional success.

The Allen A. Copping Excellence in Teaching Award was presented to Dr. A.C. Liles, III, Associate Professor of Clinical Comprehensive Dentistry. The award honors one outstanding faculty member in each of LSU Health New Orleans' six schools. Students and colleagues who nominated Dr. Liles described

him as a compassionate educator who supports students as both clinicians and individuals, fosters confidence, encourages growth, and sets an example of what every dentist should strive to be—kind, approachable, and optimistic.

Amanda Bryant, DDS Class of 2026 President, delivered reflections on the challenges, growth, and teamwork that defined students' experiences at LSUSD. She thanked family, faculty, staff, and fellow graduates for their support and emphasized the importance of collaboration among dentists, dental hygienists, and dental laboratory technicians in providing exceptional patient care.

"Although we each serve a different role, we share the same goal, caring for patients and helping improve their lives through their smiles," Bryant said. "The best dentistry doesn't happen alone. It happens when we trust and respect each other and work together. This journey has forever changed us. It has made us stronger and more aware of the responsibility we now hold."

The ceremony concluded with remarks from Dr. Sandra Andrieu, Professor and Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, who commented on the transformative power of education, gratitude, and lifelong learning. She applauded the faculty, staff, families, and friends who supported the graduates' journeys and reminded graduates that their degrees are both an earned achievement and a gift that will create opportunities throughout their lives.

"No one can ever take this education from you. This gift will empower you, expand your horizons, and enrich your lives in ways you cannot yet fully imagine," Dr. Andrieu emphasized. "Education prepares you to become thoughtful and ethical leaders. Education drives progress and innovation, allowing each of you to make meaningful contributions to society. Education helps you discover and fulfill your potential."

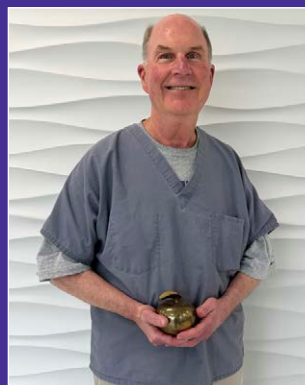

Advanced Education Graduates Honored at Certificate Ceremony

Graduating residents of LSUSD's Advanced Education Programs in Endodontics, General Practice Residency, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, Orthodontics, Pediatric Dentistry, Periodontics, and Prosthodontics were recognized in a Certificate Ceremony on June 19 at the LSU Health New Orleans Human Development Center.



Dr. Paul Armbruster, Director of Advanced Education, presided over the ceremony, which included remarks from Dr. John Gallo, Dean and Dr. Sandra Andrieu, Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

Each year, three graduating residents are recognized for excellence in research as judged at the Advanced Education Annual Research Day. The first place award is the Dr. Robert B. Brannon Research Award, given to a resident whose work emulates the legacy of Dr. Brannon, an internationally distinguished oral and maxillofacial pathologist, former head of LSUSD Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology, and decorated U.S. Air Force colonel who dedicated his career to advancing research, education, patient care, and forensic dentistry.

Dr. Steve Carstensen

is a nationally and internationally recognized leader in dental sleep medicine, holding multiple fellowships and diplomate status with the American Board of Dental Sleep Medicine. Based in Bellevue, WA, he has treated sleep apnea and snoring since 1998 and serves as an ADA consultant while leading its Children's Airway Initiative. An educator, author, and co-founder of *Dental Sleep Practice Magazine*, he lectures globally, teaches at the Pankey Institute, and contributed to *A Clinician's Handbook for Dental Sleep Medicine*. He received the 2023 AADSM Distinguished Service Award.



The Primary Care Dentist's Role in Sleep and Breathing

This lecture examines the role of dental professionals in identifying, evaluating, and managing sleep-related breathing disorders. Participants will explore the relationship between dental conditions and sleep-disordered breathing, including the impact on treatment planning and patient outcomes. The course will review diagnostic pathways, patient communication strategies, and therapeutic options such as oral appliance therapy, with consideration of associated risks and complications.

Learning Objectives

After completing this activity, the learner will be able to:

- **Recognize** the impact of sleep-related breathing disorders on oral health and dental treatment planning
- **Discuss** appropriate evaluation, diagnosis, and referral pathways for patients with suspected sleep apnea
- **Implement** basic principles of oral appliance therapy and identify potential complications

Early Proactive Intervention Sets Up Optimal Breathing for Life

This lecture focuses on the role of early intervention in establishing healthy breathing patterns and supporting craniofacial development. Participants will examine how structural and behavioral factors influence airway function across the lifespan. The course will address identification of patients with compromised nasal breathing, appropriate referral and treatment strategies, and practical approaches to improving airway health in both pediatric and adult populations.

Learning Objectives

After completing this activity, the learner will be able to:

- **Evaluate** nasal function and identify patients who may benefit from intervention
- **Explain** the impact of breathing patterns on craniofacial growth and development in children
- **Demonstrate** patient education strategies to support improved breathing patterns across age groups

Dr. Aaron (Seok Hwan) Cho

is a board-certified prosthodontist and Chair and Associate Professor at the University of Iowa College of Dentistry, with prior leadership roles at Texas A&M College of Dentistry. He trained at Seoul National University and Texas A&M and has received honors including the Stanley D. Tylman Research Award and the Claude R. Baker Faculty Award. He lectures internationally on digital dentistry, implant prosthodontics, and All-on-X full-arch rehabilitation, and developed the D.E.A.R. (Digital Engineering-Analog Reflection) concept to enhance treatment predictability.



4 Strategies for CAD/CAM Fundamentals for Digital Chairside Workflow: Clinical Strategy for Digital Dentistry

This lecture provides a structured, clinically focused introduction to CAD/CAM dentistry and its application in chairside workflows. Participants will be guided through the key components of digital dentistry, including data acquisition, design, material selection, and fabrication processes. Emphasis will be placed on clinical decision-making, workflow integration, and practical application rather than software-specific techniques. Current and emerging technologies, including advanced CAD/CAM systems will also be reviewed to support evidence-based adoption in clinical practice.

Learning Objectives

After completing this activity, the learner will be able to:

- **Describe** fundamental CAD/CAM concepts and terminology relevant to clinical dentistry
- **Outline** the steps involved in a complete chairside digital workflow
- **Assess** the clinical applications, advantages, and limitations of current and emerging digital technologies

D.E.A.R. Full-Arch Digital Impression: Digital Engineering-Analog Reflection for Predictable Implant Prosthodontics

This lecture provides a comprehensive, clinically oriented review of full-arch implant digital impression techniques. Participants will examine various digital systems, including scan body workflows, marker-based systems, photogrammetry, and hybrid approaches. The presentation will highlight key clinical considerations such as accuracy, efficiency, and workflow integration. The D.E.A.R. (Digital Engineering-Analog Reflection) concept will be introduced as a framework for combining digital technologies with established prosthodontic principles to improve treatment predictability.

Learning Objectives

After completing this activity, the learner will be able to:

- **Classify** current full-arch implant digital impression systems and workflows
- **Compare** the clinical performance, advantages, and limitations of different digital impression techniques
- **Apply** principles of digital impression workflows to enhance predictability in implant prosthodontic treatment

A New Chapter for Our School: An Update from Dean John Gallo

I'm excited to share an update on something many of us have been looking forward to for a long time: the major renovations and upgrades to our School have officially begun.

Thanks to a historic investment of approximately \$100 million from the Louisiana Legislature and LSU Health New Orleans, we are

embarking on the most significant transformation of our facilities in more than 50 years. To say we are excited would be an understatement.

Over the next three years, you'll see exciting changes across our campus designed to improve the experience for our students, faculty, staff, residents, and patients. While construction will occasionally bring some inconveniences, the end result will be a modernized, more efficient, and more welcoming environment for everyone.



Projects Currently Underway

Several key projects are already in progress or will begin very soon, including:

- Renovation of the 2nd floor clinic dispensary and waiting room, with similar upgrades to the 3rd and 4th floor areas to follow.
- Construction of a new Central Lab on the 2nd floor.
- Return of the Screening Clinic on the 1st floor of the Clinic Building.
- Creation of a new Wellness Center/Gym.
- Replacement of windows on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the Administration Building to improve energy efficiency and prevent leaks.
- Complete renovation of Auditorium C, creating a modern learning environment for future generations.
- Upgraded A/V technology in Auditoriums A and B, which is already complete. New seating will be installed at the end of the academic year.



What's Coming Next

Additional projects scheduled to begin over the next several months and years include:

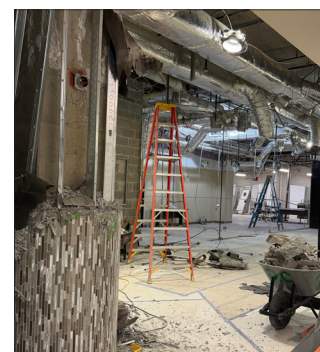
- Replacement of flooring in the 3rd floor clinic.
- Renovation of the 2nd floor clinic.
- Full renovation of the DLT Lab on the 3rd floor.
- Renovations to the 5th floor of the Clinic Building.
- Comprehensive update to the library, creating a modern learning space.
- Renovation of the 2nd floor of the Administration Building.
- Development of a new digital dental lab.

Looking Ahead

Additional future projects include the complete renovation of the 4th floor clinics, updates for the 6th and 8th floors, and improvements to the Postgraduate Prosthodontics Lab, among other initiatives currently in planning and design.

Our goal is to complete these renovations within the next three years, and there are other projects in development that may not yet appear on the current list. As plans are finalized, we will continue to share updates along the way.

This is an exciting time for our School. These investments reflect confidence in our mission and our future, and they will help ensure that we continue providing an outstanding educational experience and exceptional patient care for decades to come. Thank you for your patience and flexibility as we work through the construction process—we can't wait to see the finished result. ■

■ How a DLT Degree Became the Foundation for One LSUSD Graduate's Career in Dentistry

When I first enrolled in the Dental Laboratory Technology (DLT) program at LSUSD, my goal was to become a dentist. I viewed the DLT program as a safety net while I worked toward getting accepted into dental school. Looking back now as a general dentist, I can honestly say that enrolling in the DLT program was one of the best decisions I have ever made.

What I thought would simply be a backup plan became the foundation that shaped the way I practice dentistry today. The DLT program gave me an understanding of dentistry that extends beyond what is typically taught in dental school, especially in fixed and removable prosthodontics. I learned dental terminology, laboratory procedures, material science, the strengths and limitations of restorative materials, and, most importantly, how to think critically through restorative cases.

During dental school, I realized I was learning very similar material again, but from an entirely different perspective. In the DLT program, I learned to think like the technician fabricating the restoration. In dental school, I learned to think like the clinician diagnosing and treating patients. Bringing those two perspectives together gave me a much more complete understanding of dentistry than I could have gained from either path alone.

Because I already had a strong laboratory foundation, I was able to spend less time mastering laboratory concepts and more time focusing on my clinical procedures, patient care, and didactic education. Instead of only understanding how to prepare a tooth or take an impression, I understood what happened after the case left my hands and how my clinical decisions directly affected the final restoration. I was fortunate to complete many of my cases as both the treating dental student and the dental laboratory technician. Looking back, that experience is something I am especially proud of because it gave me a deeper understanding of both the clinical and laboratory aspects of patient care.

Now, two years into practicing as a general dentist, I appreciate the value of that education more than ever. Every day I find myself drawing from both my laboratory and clinical training. Understanding how restorations are designed, fabricated, and

adjusted has strengthened my treatment planning, improved my communication with dental laboratories, and given me greater confidence when restoring my patients. I truly believe that combining those two perspectives has allowed my clinical skills to flourish.

I also gained an immense respect for the profession of dental laboratory technology itself. DLT was far more than a stepping stone to dental school for me. It is an outstanding career that requires precision, artistry, critical thinking, and technical expertise. The work dental laboratory technicians perform is essential to the successful treatment of countless patients, and I have an even greater appreciation for that now that I practice as a dentist.

I truly believe every dentist with an interest in prosthodontics or restorative dentistry would benefit from spending time in a dental laboratory. There is simply no substitute for understanding how restorations are created and how clinical decisions influence the final result. More broadly, I encourage anyone interested in the dental field to consider the DLT program. Whether your goal is to become a dental laboratory technician, a dentist, or another member of the dental team, the knowledge, discipline, and perspective you gain are invaluable.

It is a privilege to say that I am both a DLT and DDS graduate of the LSU Health New Orleans School of Dentistry. Those experiences have shaped not only the dentist I have become but also the professional I strive to be every day. I will always be proud to represent both programs and forever grateful for the education, mentorship, and lifelong friendships I gained at LSUSD. Looking back, what I once considered a safety net became the catalyst for my career and one of the greatest blessings of my professional life. If I had the opportunity to do it all over again, I would choose the DLT program without hesitation.

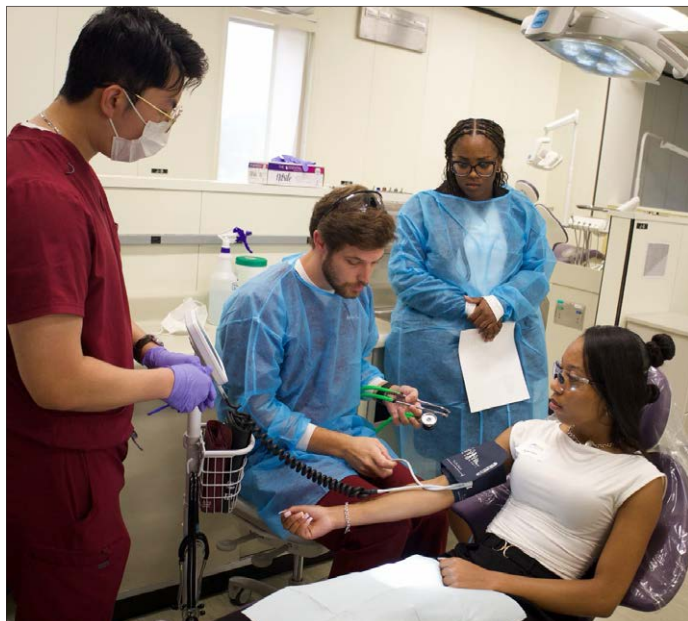
■ DLT Application Period Open for Fall 2027

Annual Summer Program Helps Students Build Various Skills

Khoyneshad Represents LSUSD at National Summit

Dr. Shirin Khoyneshad represented LSUSD the historic **Reimagining Dental Education Summit**, held June 11–13, 2026 at the Harvard School of Dental Medicine (HSDM). The Summit convened leaders from 36 dental schools across the U.S., UK, and Canada alongside representatives from the [ADA](#), [ADEA](#), [NIDCR](#), and [AADOCR](#) with the goal was of reimagining dental education for the next 100

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years, confronting workforce shortages, gaps in access to care, rising student debt, and disruptive new technologies. Dr. Khoynezhad served on Working Group 3—Academic Career Pathways for Clinical Educators/Scientists—one of six groups tasked with taking action on dentistry's most pressing areas. Dr. Khoynezhad's contributions included co-authorship of a forthcoming manuscript for the *Journal of Dental Education* capturing the group's recommendations. Her participation reflects LSUSD's voice at the table for this once-in-a-generation moment shaping the future of dentistry.

Journal Club Helps Residents Advance Evidence-Based Education

The Journal Club is a cornerstone of the Advanced Education Program in Prosthodontics, providing residents with the opportunity to stay current with the latest scientific advances while strengthening their critical thinking and presentation skills. Held monthly throughout the academic year, the club consists of nine sessions, each led by a different prosthodontics resident, during which the resident presents a critical assessment of a recently published article from a leading journal. These discussions encourage thoughtful analysis, evidence-based decision-making, meaningful dialogue among residents and faculty, and improved patient care.

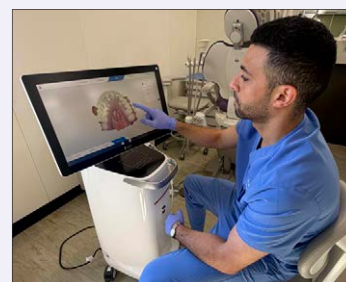

LSUSD Prepares Digital-Ready Prosthodontists

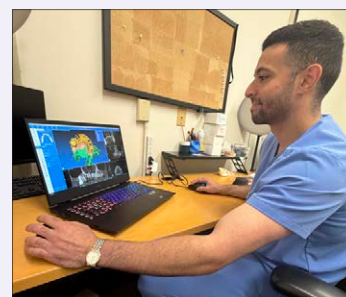
The Advanced Education in Prosthodontics program pairs foundational restorative dentistry training with cutting-edge digital workflows. Residents gain hands-on experience with intraoral scanning, CAD design, guided implant surgery, and 3D printing, preparing them to deliver precise, efficient, and patient-centered care.

Dr. Mohamed Aref, a 2026 program graduate, recently demonstrated these technologies (pictured at right):

- **Intraoral Scanning:** Advanced digital scanning captures highly accurate images of patients' teeth and oral tissues, improving patient comfort. The resulting digital files serve as the foundation for designing crowns, dentures, implant restorations, and other prosthetic devices.
- **Dental CAD Software:** Clinicians upload patients' intraoral scans into dental CAD software to design crowns, dentures, implants, and other appliances, which allows them to visualize restorations before fabrication and adjust virtually, increasing treatment accuracy and efficiency.
- **Guided Implant Surgery Software:** Combines digital scans and CBCT imaging to plan optimal implant placement before surgery. Custom surgical guides translate the digital plan to the clinical setting, improving precision, predictability, and patient outcomes.

Growing Our Own: Preparing Dentists Who Will Call Rural Louisiana Home

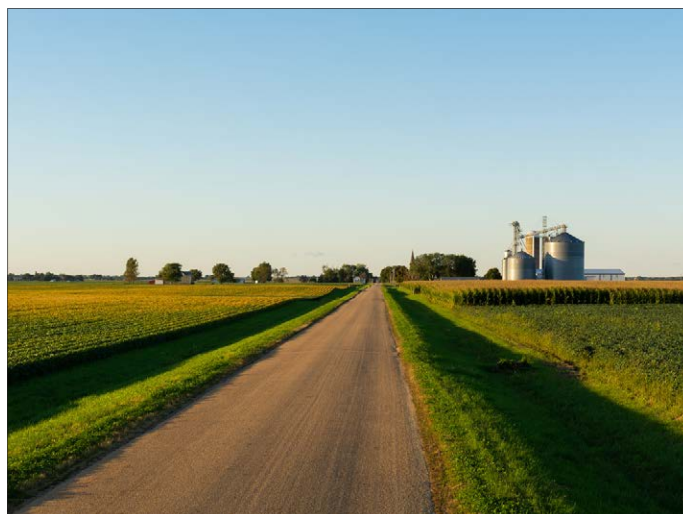
Every parish in Louisiana deserves access to a dentist who understands the community, knows its people, and is committed to building a practice there. That conviction anchors the LSUSD's strategic direction for strengthening the Dental Rural Track Scholars (RTS) Program.

The need is substantial. Louisiana continues to experience a persistent maldistribution of dentists, leaving many rural and underserved communities without adequate access to oral health care. Nationally, rural counties have roughly half as many dentists per capita as urban communities, approximately 33 versus 65 dentists per 100,000 residents. Louisiana has also experienced a net loss of early career dentists to other states in recent years, reinforcing the importance of developing and retaining a workforce that serves Louisiana.

Research points to two particularly important workforce development strategies. The first is recruiting students who have meaningful connections to rural communities, because rural upbringing and personal relationships are strong predictors of rural practice. The second is providing students with substantive community-based clinical experiences that build their confidence, awareness of community needs and resources, and readiness to care for underserved populations.

The Dental RTS Program brings these strategies together. Students with a rural Louisiana upbringing or a demonstrated commitment to underserved communities are encouraged to apply for tuition support made possible through endowed gifts to the LSU Health Foundation. In return, scholars commit to practicing in an approved, high-need community for at least 15 months for each year of tuition support. This service-linked investment helps reduce educational debt while creating a direct pathway from dental school to the communities where dentists are needed.

Through LSUSD's community-based education course, fourth-year dental students will provide supervised care at affiliated safety-net clinics in



New Orleans and Baton Rouge. LSUSD is exploring additional partnerships in other regions of the state, including the Alexandria area. These experiences combine patient care with structured reflection and a deeper understanding of the social and economic factors that shape a community.

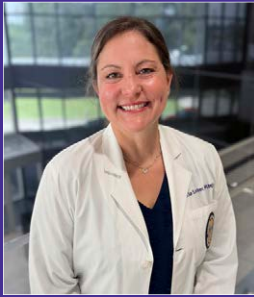
The School recently launched the Rural Dental Scholars Mentorship Program, which pairs each scholar with a practicing rural Louisiana dentist for three to six conversations annually. Mentors share their lived experience with rural practice and provide practical guidance about practice financing, Medicaid participation, professional relationships and the challenges and rewards of small-town dentistry. Mentor relationships are intended to support scholars as they move from predoctoral education into sustainable rural practice.

LSUSD cannot accomplish this work alone. We invite alumni and rural dentists throughout Louisiana to serve as mentors, clinical partners, and champions for the next generation of caregivers. Growing our own dental workforce is more than a scholarship strategy. It's a long-term commitment to Louisiana that we intend to support, one student and one community at a time.

Periodontics Show 'N Tell Event Features Innovation in Implant Dentistry

On May 29, LSUSD's Department of Periodontics hosted its annual Show 'N Tell event, with 51 participants attending in person and virtually. Attendees earned six hours of continuing education during the day-long event, which continues to serve as a cornerstone of advanced clinical learning and collaboration within the specialty.

Supported by the R. Jack and Mary Louise Cassingham Endowed Chair in Periodontics, Show 'N Tell brings together residents, faculty, alumni, and invited experts for a focused exchange of clinical knowledge and innovation. The event reflects the legacy of Dr. Jack Cassingham, who helped establish the LSUSD postdoctoral periodontics program in 1974 and dedicated decades to advancing periodontal education and patient care.

This year's featured speaker, Dr. John M. Tsourounakis,

presented "Blueprint to Smile: A Facially Driven Digital Workflow for Implant Rehabilitation."

A 2012 graduate of LSUSD's Advanced Education Program in Periodontics and fellowship-trained in implant dentistry, Dr. Tsourounakis is a board-certified periodontist who maintains a private practice in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and serves as a clinical instructor at the University of Manitoba.

Dr. Tsourounakis' presentation emphasized outcome-driven treatment planning—beginning with the desired final restoration and working backward to plan each step to get there by using facially driven diagnostics, digital workflows, and guided surgical execution for both multi-implant restorations and full-arch rehabilitation.

Attendees gained insight into reverse-engineering implant placement and selecting materials and components to create restorative solutions that are easier to maintain, longer-lasting, more comfortable for patients, and supportive of long-term oral health. A key focus throughout the lecture was the importance of streamlined communication between clinicians and laboratory teams to ensure digital plans translate into consistent, repeatable clinical success.

The event also showcased LSUSD's commitment to interdisciplinary collaboration, particularly with the Department of Prosthodontics, which has

participated in the event for the past four years on complex restorative cases.

In the afternoon session, third-year periodontics residents Drs. Daeoo Lee, Cyrus Mansouri, and Veronica Xia along with implant fellow Dr. Emily Dalluge presented case studies, demonstrating their clinical training and innovation.

Federal Legislation Introduced to Apply State Dental Insurance Laws to Self-Funded Plans

The LDA and ADA are supporting a new piece of federal legislation aimed at ensuring that state dental insurance reform laws apply to self-funded dental plans.

Louisiana has been very successful over the years in passing these insurance reform laws, therefore this federal legislation could be a game changer.

The Improving Dental Administration Act, or IDA, was introduced by Reps. Jeff Van Drew, DMD, R-NJ, and Herb Conaway, MD, D-NJ. The measure would ensure that the more than 360 state dental insurance reform and patient protection laws enacted in the past decade apply to patients enrolled in self-insured plans.

Rep. Cleo Fields, D-LA, has already agreed to cosponsoring IDA. The LDA will be working with our grassroots action team leader dentists to ask ALL of our congressional delegation to also consider cosponsoring.

Dentists and patients in Louisiana appreciate support from Rep. Fields for this important legislation, which closes the loophole in ERISA that has created a two-tiered system of consumer protections for patients in our state. Louisianians deserve the same protections when it comes to their dental coverage, regardless of how their dental benefits are designed. The IDA Act would help

restore fairness and consistency by ensuring that state laws governing dental benefit administration apply equally to all patients and providers while protecting federal benefit design rules.

Self-funded dental plans are regulated under the federal Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, or ERISA. Some dental carriers have argued that the law allows them to avoid complying with state insurance regulations designed to protect patients and providers, and the ADA said it wants to close the loophole and return the power to regulate health care to the states.

"The growing number of 'self-funded' plans regulated by ERISA has emboldened carriers to assert they are not subject to state oversight, claiming that the ERISA preemption gives them a free pass to ignore insurance laws," said ADA President Richard Rosato, DMD. "We need to fix this ERISA loophole that keeps state regulators from enforcing pro-consumer insurance laws enacted in their states. Patients and providers should not be left unprotected based simply on how their dental benefits are purchased."

According to the ADA, the continued growth of self-funded plans, compared with fully insured plans, has contributed to confusion about which laws carriers must follow. ERISA was originally intended to protect retirement plan assets, including 401(k), 403(b) and pension plans.
